School Safety Plan (School Year 2017-18)

Valley Teen Ranch Community Day School & Educational Options has a Safe School Plan that is reviewed and updated annually. Plans are reviewed with staff annually often at the beginning of each School Year. Our School Site Council (SSC) approves our Safe School Plan. Emergency drills are conducted to prepare students and staff in the event of an emergency. We strive to maintain a safe, clean, respectful and orderly school campus that encourages positive attitudes in students and staff. A joint effort between students and staff help keep the campus clean and litter free. Site maintenance staff surveys their campus as the first order of business each day. They insure the campus is clean, any vandalism is corrected, and that the campus is presentable and representative of the priority Golden Valley Unified School Board sets on safety and appearance. Educational Options' comprehensive safety plan was reviewed and updated in September of 2017 by the school's faculty. The plan with any changes is approved by the Golden Valley Unified School District Board of Trustees annually.

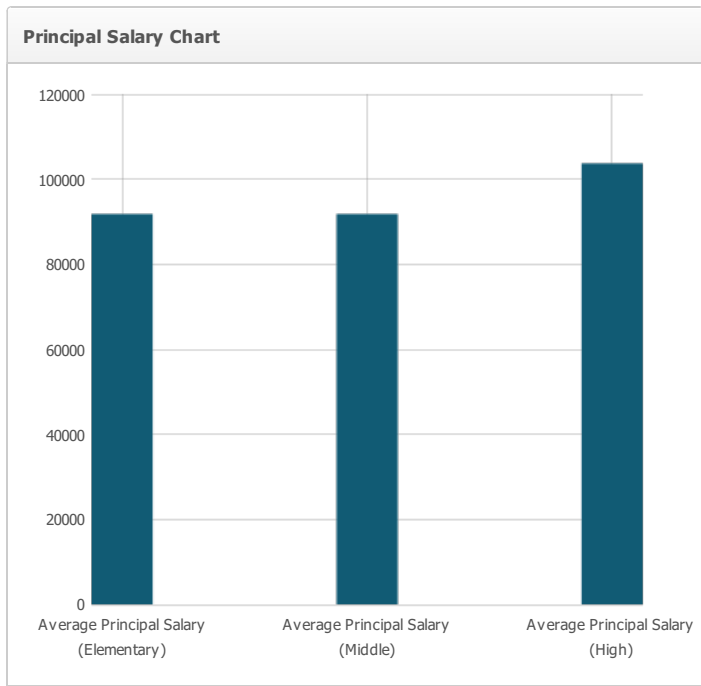
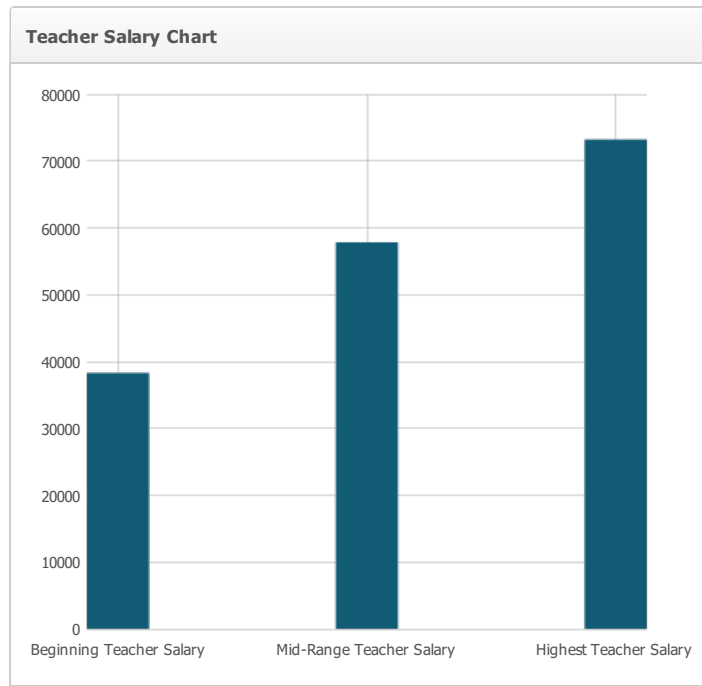
