Modernizing Local Schools

- ▶ If we want our local students to succeed in high school, college, and careers, they must be skilled in the use of today's technologies and have a solid background in science, math, and technology
- ▶ Current facilities are inadequate to our students' ability to build those skills



Local School Improvement Funding

The LEUSD Board of Trustees has approved placing a school bond measure on the November 8, 2016 ballot (*Measure 'V'*) that would:

- ▶ Upgrade local schools to support high-quality instruction in math and science
- ▶ Upgrade classrooms and computers to keep pace with technology
- ▶ Upgrade schools to support career and technology education to prepare students for college and high-demand jobs in fields like health sciences, engineering, technology, and skilled trades



Local School Improvement Funding

The bond measure would also:

- ▶ Improve student safety and security, including fencing, cameras, emergency communications, and fire and earthquake safety systems
- ▶ Upgrade old playgrounds and fields to meet current health and safety standards
- ▶ Improve heating, ventilation, insulation, doors, and windows to increase energy efficiency and save money



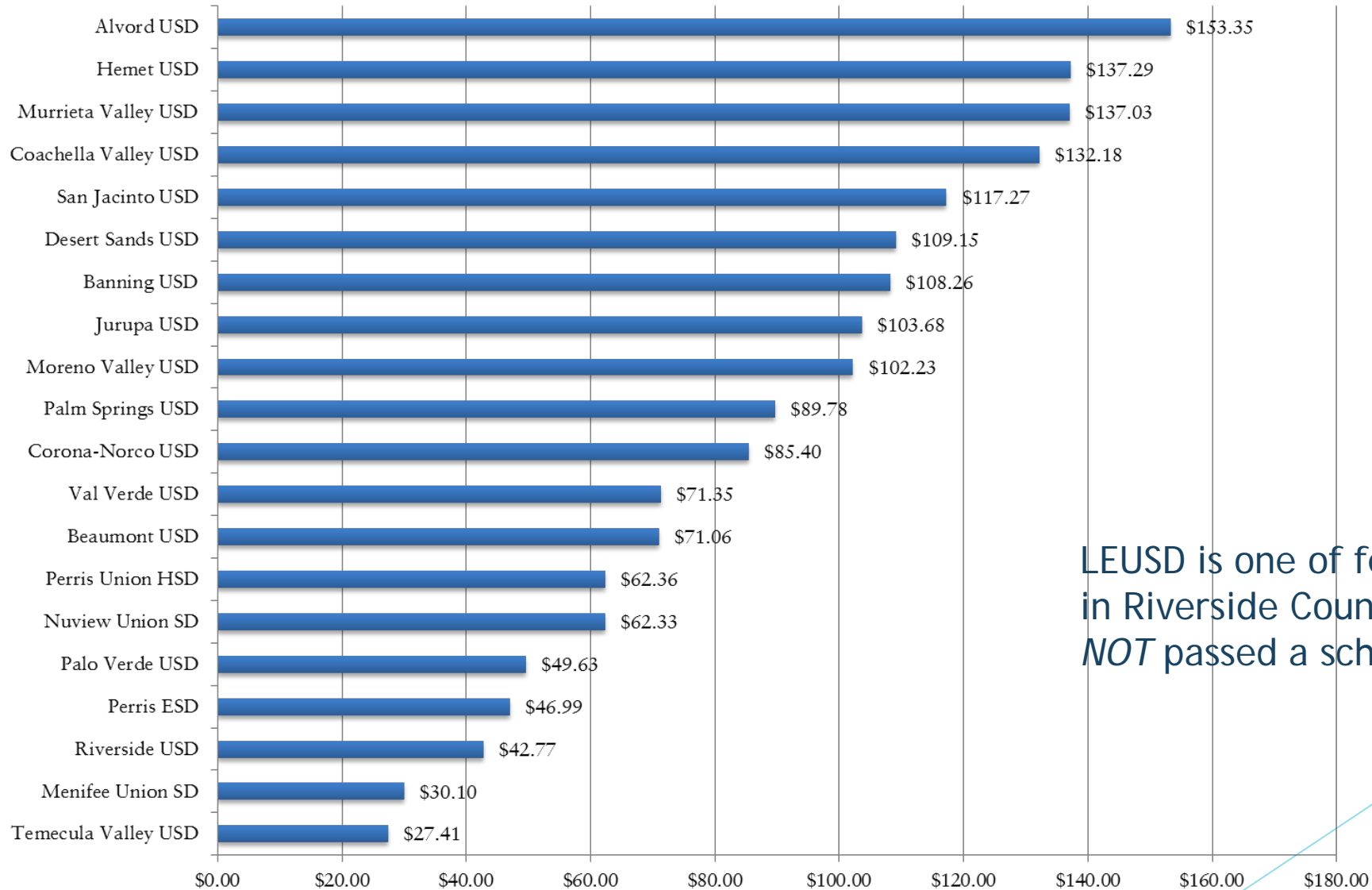
Local School Improvement Funding

This school bond measure would also provide:

- ▶ Facilities and equipment to support high-quality instruction in music and the arts
- ▶ Classrooms and schools to reduce student overcrowding and support student education for a 21st Century learning environment

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Strict Financial Accountability

- ▶ All money raised would stay local to support our students and could not be taken away by the State or used for other purposes
- ▶ Proposed measure requires clear system of accountability
 - ▶ Specific project list
 - ▶ Independent citizens' oversight committee
 - ▶ Annual audits
- ▶ Measure would make our schools eligible for millions of dollars in state matching funds that might otherwise go to other communities
