School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

As per the Williams' settlement, all Oak Grove schools are maintained in a manner that assures a clean, safe, and functional site as determined by periodic evaluation.

Measure P: On November 4, 2014 the voters in Oak Grove School District approved the issuance of Measure P. Measure P authorized the issuance of \$89.8 million in bonds to benefit the Oak Grove School District. The funds are meant to be used to renovate, repair, acquire, construct and modernize classrooms and facilities, and increase student access to computers and technology.

During the summer of 2015, this site had approximately 5 million dollars of HVAC, Roofing, Interior Finishes and Fire Lane renovations completed.

After the successful completion of the measure Q Bond program, the Oak Grove community approved Measure S in November 2008 that authorized an additional \$125 million General Obligation Bond to continue needed school modernization projects, construct two new intermediate school gymnasiums, and solar technology systems throughout the district. Combined with local Routine Repair funds and State Deferred Maintenance funds, future facility improvements will insure that critical services continue to be provided for our students for years to come.

Opportunities for Parental Involvement - (School Year 2016–17)

Committee/parent meeting opportunities such as School Site Council, Home and School Club, GATE parent meetings, District Advisory Council, African/African American and Latino parent meetings give all parents access to the school and district. Through our YMCA after school program, parents participate in activities that encourage healthy living. All parents are encouraged to participate actively in their child's learning. Del Roble School also collaborates with Foothill College by holding non-credit Family Engagement Institute courses.

Home and School Club:

Home and School Club is an active volunteer organization for parents to support the programs at Del Roble School. Their financial assistance from fundraisers supports field trips, assemblies, library books, classroom reading material, technology, and student awards. They actively support the Book Fair, Walk-A-Thon, Gift-wrap Sales, Fall Festival, Red Ribbon Week, Cultural Events, Spring Carnival, Multi-Cultural events, and other community events. Home and School Club also acts as a forum for parent communications and safety issues.

School Site Council:

Parents serve on this council along with teachers and other staff to guide the distribution of SPSA funds in alignment with the School Plan. They study curriculum and student needs to determine how best to use categorical funds.

Parent Committees:

Parents are encouraged to attend various District and site committees such as GATE Parent Committee and the District Advisory Committee, and to provide liaison information to parents of Del Roble students. At African-American and Latino meetings, parents participate in regular forums for student success by receiving information and giving input.

Action Team Partnership:

The Action Team Partnership is a group of parents who meet monthly to focus on parent involvement and engagement. Parents look at school data and organize activities to increase student success by encouraging parents to be active and present in the school.

Volunteer Program:

Along with Home and School Club and School Site Council, parents are invited to volunteer time in the classrooms tutoring students or assisting teachers. They also volunteer time for campus projects, sponsoring clubs, chaperoning field trips, family learning nights, science fair, and classroom presentations.

School Safety Plan – Most Recent Year

Providing a safe school is a high priority for Del Roble School. To this end, there are continuous improvement processes and collaborative efforts that provide comprehensive health education and a strong academic foundation within a safe and secure learning environment that ensures success for all students.

Prevention education at Del Roble includes supplemental programs and policies including Positive Behavior Intervention Systems(PBIS), conflict resolution, Safe Place, conflict/peer mediation, positive discipline, refusal training for students and parents, drug, gangs, alcohol, substance abuse, bullying, and the Wellness Policy including physical education and nutritional education. Prevention Early Intervention (PEI) counseling services are located on the Del Roble campus to support students and families.

In order to reduce the number of incidents of bullying and harassment among students and to ensure that students feel neither intimidated nor threatened by bullying or harassment, Del Roble has an ongoing program that specifically addresses issues of race, ethnicity, gender, and perceptions which commonly surface in bullying/harassment incidences. We also have ongoing classroom instruction and use social settings inside and outside the classroom to focus on the life skills of empathy, anger management, and problem solving.

Attendance is closely monitored and students with unexcused absences of 10% or more receive law/school district/partnership intervention. Truancy abatement is a common goal of the school/district and other agency collaborative partnerships. Currently Del Roble has instituted an Attendance Incentive Program, which is targeting attendance and tardies.

Each year staff is educated, trained, and practices the concepts of the National Emergency Management System which includes fire drills, earthquake evacuation, first aid procedures, Run-Hide-Defend safety drill, communicable disease action plan, and emergency evacuation maps.

We balance the school discipline plan with positive incentives, as well as appropriate alternative consequence plans. School-wide expectations are posted in each classroom. Positive incentives are offered for positive behavior/attitude, good attendance, and positive wellness practices. Options to positive discipline include campus clean-up, campus projects, incentives, community services, behavior plans/contracts, and alternative placements.

We strive to improve the system of publications to students, staff, and community which will include or focus on student awards/recognition, rewards, school activities, achievements, acknowledgments, and announcements.

Professional Development

This section provides information on the annual number of school days dedicated to staff development for the most recent three-year period.

Del Roble school provides extensive training for teachers in the implementation of standards and the development of effective assessment. There are numerous opportunities for participation in District in-services, out-of-district conferences, workshops, and committees. Currently, primary teachers are being highly trained in SEAL training provided by the Sobrato Foundation and upper grade teachers are learning about Project Based Learning. Another area of focus is implementation of the California Common Core Standards and specific instruction for English learners. We are also continuing PBIS professional development. We have a leadership team/ continuous equity improvement team that lead site staff development around analyzing student work, developing effective strategies in the classroom, and using grade level time to improve instruction. Our PBIS Team presents data on behavior to the staff monthly and analysis of our behavior data informs our decision making, continually improving the safety and climate. The staff has three days of professional development in August, January and May. We also adjust Tuesdays for professional development, grade level planning and individual teacher planning.
