8 NEW ELEMENTARY LIBRARIES OPENED THANKS TO COMMUNITY

Rowland Unified neighborhood schools are being modernized thanks to voters who approved the \$118 million Measure R General Obligation Bond. The District has aggressively pursued state bond matching funds. Some of those funds have been captured and *the District is in the process of applying for an additional \$14 million to augment the community's investment.*

Dedicated to school facility construction projects that include classroom modernization, electrical, plumbing and energy modernization, new construction and federally-mandated upgrades to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 at schools, this *2008-09 Annual Report by the Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee* highlights recent projects.

Thriving communities have great schools. We will continue to do our part in providing exceptional education programs at safe and vibrant schools that help protect property values and the quality of life in our neighborhoods.

8 New Libraries! The District is proud to have opened eight new elementary libraries – with more to come – thanks to the Measure R Bond and a partnership with The Wonder of Reading nonprofit foundation. These beautiful libraries have doubled the space available to our students. Each of the libraries at *Hollingworth, Hurley, Jellick, La Seda, Northam, Rorimer, Rowland and Villacorta* Elementary Schools feature a mini-amphitheater for story telling, computer research and tutoring stations, along with inviting reading areas. The Wonder of Reading program replaces outdated books with \$10,000 worth of new books. It also trains volunteers to read one-on-one with students for an hour every week for the entire school year to increase their reading skills. *Next in 2010: Ybarra Academy of Arts and Technology Library!*


Features of Classroom Modernizations

NEW SCIENCE LABS PLANNED FOR GIANO

Giano students and staff such as Science Teacher Mike Cody (pictured) are excited about plans for new science labs that will feature a teacher's demonstration table, chemical-resistant science furniture, new sinks, lab preparation area, storage cabinets for microscopes and other science equipment, and upgraded electrical and technology systems. Plans have been approved by the Division of the State Architect (DSA) and are in the pre-construction phase.



REVVED UP AND READY...

Revamped Nogales Autoshop

Our District is one of the leaders in the state for receiving approval of matching funding by the State Allocation Board for Career Technical Education Projects. *More than \$4 million in modernization grants* has been approved for the Auto Repair Program at Nogales High School, the Culinary Arts/JAR program at Rowland High School, and the Business and Information Technology programs at both high schools.



The Automotive Repair Program at Nogales prepares and trains students aspiring to enter careers in the automotive and transportation fields. The modernized facility features upgraded electrical power and technology outlets/drops, replacement of rollup doors for moving donated cars and engines in and out of the shop, and equipment equivalent to current industry standards for auto repair and smog checks. New high-tech auto repair equipment includes in-ground auto lifts, tire machine, balancer, valve grinder, lathe, welder, tube bender, and drill press. Nearly 50 years old, the existing structure is retrofitted with new workbenches, storage area and installation of proper ventilation and waste disposal systems. The State has approved a matching grant of \$1,080,003 for a total project amount of \$2,160,006.

FREQUENTLY ASKED MEASURE R BOND QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Why were the new tracks and football field projects at both Nogales and Rowland High Schools completed first?

Safety of our students and cost-savings. For several years there were parent complaints about the quality of the fields. There were significant long-term cost-savings for installing synthetic turfs and tracks, including rebates for water conservation and overall field maintenance costs. Safety for student athletes has improved.

When a project is DSA Approved – how long until the work is finished?

Every project has multiple variables to determine a completion date. However, the typical construction process is as follows:

- 1) Program and Planning
- 2) Architect design
- 3) Division of the State Architect (DSA) Review Process (Generally takes 6-8 months)
- 4) Pre-construction Phase (logistics such as temporary housing, moving classrooms and school scheduling)
- 5) Bidding process for contractors (2-3 months)
- 6) Construction Phase

Rowland Unified School District is proud to serve 16,500 students at 23 elementary and secondary schools in the communities of Rowland Heights, Walnut, West Covina, La Puente, and City of Industry. Independent Audit Reports Give Rowland Unified High Marks

Every year, the District is mandated by the state to have an audit performed on the Measure R 2006 Bond finances. The audit is comprised of two separate audits: financial and performance.

The financial audit verifies that funds are being spent in compliance with state laws and guidelines. The performance audit shows the local community how the District has expended the bond proceeds. Audit subjects include: compliance with ballot language, compliance with District policies and guidelines, best practices for procurement and procedures of construction.

The auditors, Vincenti, Lloyd and Stutzman, LLP, concluded for the 2007-08 audit reports that the District had complied with all applicable accounting standards for governmental agencies. In addition, they found the Measure R financial statements free of material misstatements and no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under Governmental Auditing Standards.

The auditor also concluded that the District had properly accounted for the expenditure of funds held in the Bond Building Fund and that such expenditures were made for authorized bond projects. They further concluded that the bond funds were not expended for salaries of school administrators or other operating expenditures.

On December 3, 2009, the Committee will receive the 2008-09 Financial Audit and Performance Audit reports for review and approval.

2008-09 Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee Activities

The Committee met four times between September 2008 and June 2009 to receive, review and discuss the following: Program Status Updates, Program Financial Reports, Project Status Reports and Bid Status of Various Projects. The Committee approved the Program Financial Reports at each meeting.
