DeLuca & Cirelli speak at graduation

Josephine DeLuca, in her address to her fellow graduates of the Class of 2006 at Archbishop Molloy High School, wished them “luck in their future endeavors as they shape tomorrow” in her valedictorian speech Saturday June 3 at Colden Auditorium at Queens College.

DeLuca, who will attend New York University next fall on a \$15,000 Trustee Scholarship, said, “The Class of 2006 is filled with caring, intelligent, talented people. As a class we’ve been able to work together and learn from each other’s unique traits and perspectives.

“I can also recall countless memories of my classmates warmly welcoming a new member into a group, lending a helping hand, or offering to listen to a problem. I will miss the collaboration and friendship of the Class of 2006.”

DeLuca was named valedictorian for having the highest academic average overall in the Class of 2006 over a four-year period.

She was informed of her honor after returning from Easter break in April.

“I was pleasantly surprised,” she said, “because I know that there are so many intelligent and excellent students in the school.”

Being the top academic achiever of the Class of 2006 was not something DeLuca had made a serious goal for this year; she said she simply worked hard and tried her best throughout her four years of high school.

She credits her academic success at Molloy to “hard work, an excellent faculty, and peer collaboration on group projects.”

One thing DeLuca didn’t do was spend all her time studying.

“I have so many wonderful memories at Molloy, ranging from funny experiences in class to weekend retreats at Esopus, to our [school] trip to Greece, to playing with the kids at the Briarwood Shelter, to attending special events like Rock Aid, International Day, and the Talent Show,” she said.

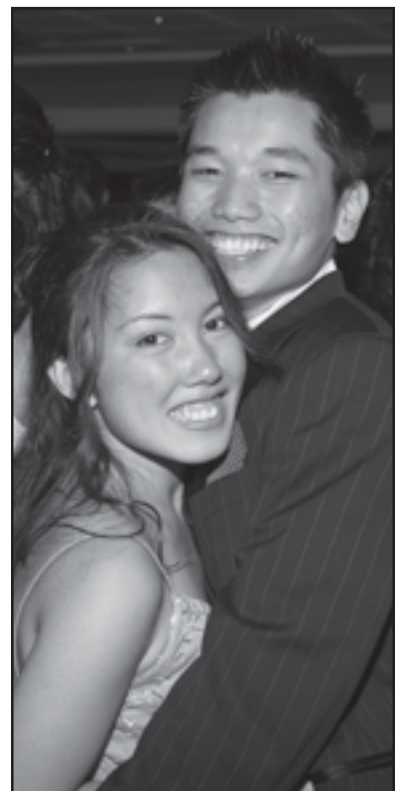

Class of 2006 college destinations

The nation's most competitive colleges are becoming harder for high school students to gain admission to, but Stanner seniors are bucking this trend, according to Mr. Kerry Hughes, Molloy's college adviser.

According to The Wall Street Journal, colleges ranked "most competitive" in the nation accepted far fewer applicants percentage-wise this year.

Mr. Hughes offered as an example Ivy League school Brown University, which offered admission to only 13.8%

of applicants this spring, down from the 14.6% it had accepted last year.

Despite this more competitive atmosphere, more Molloy seniors were accepted by the nation's top colleges and universities than last year, Mr. Hughes said.

Five seniors were accepted by Columbia University, five by Cornell, two by Harvard, and one each by Georgetown, Johns Hopkins and Notre Dame.

As a group, the SUNY and CUNY

schools are the most popular college destinations for Stanners.

Historically, between 50% and 75% of Molloy seniors apply to schools within the SUNY and CUNY systems, and while those numbers didn't change this year, more current Molloy seniors applied to one or more of the nation's elite colleges and universities than in years past.

One local university that is suffering from the college admissions success of this year's Stanner seniors is St. John's

University, said Mr. Hughes.

For the last few years, St. John's has been the most applied to college by Molloy seniors. While this statistic held true this year, the number of Stanners who have committed to attend St. John's is down over 33%.

Mr. Hughes said that 100% of the Class of 2006 applied to college and all were accepted to at least one. He cited Molloy's outstanding academic reputation as the reason for that impressive statistic.
