Fourth and fifth grade girls have been engaging in a new experience at Hartford Upper Elementary. This fall we started a "Girls on the Run" program in Hartford. This program is designed for students in grades 3-5 and has proven to be a very positive experience for everyone involved.



The YMCA runs the program through local school districts. Each district is responsible for finding VOLUNTEER coaches to lead the group through 10



weeks of curriculum and exercise. The final step is completing a 5K run in Des Moines with all of the other local schools and their attendees. The curriculum is broad in topics but all tie directly to items that girls of this age might be dealing with.



Hartford has approximately 35 girls participating and 4 teachers that volunteer their time after school on Tuesday and Thursday for 10 weeks. The Hartford teachers directly involved in the program at Hartford are Ms. Hannah Hill (lead teacher), Mrs. Lauren Mentzer (lead teacher), Mrs. Brianne Sears (assistant), and Mrs. Rhonda Ray (assistant). Their time and energy are greatly appreciated and we look forward to building this program in years to come.

We look forward to supporting these girls in one more week of practice and in the final 5K run on November 12th. Keep up the great work!

World Food Prize Global Youth Conference



October 18 through October 21, Leonora James, CHS senior, was selected to participate in this year's World Food Prize Global Youth Conference. To qualify for this honor, Leo wrote a paper for the Iowa Youth Institute about her idea to solve world hunger. She competed last April at ISU, and was one of only 200 students worldwide to go on to the Global Youth Institute.

Leo added to her paper, and submitted it in June. At the GYI, Leo interacted with students from 27 different states and 7 different countries. She was also able to learn from young people who have gone on from this experience to become Borlaug-Ruan Scholars and Wallace-Carver Fellows. Each day was spent listening to scholars, CEOs of top corporations, and world leaders as they spoke about ways to solve the problems of food scarcity and poor nutrition. Leo took part in cultural activities, Borlaug dialogue sessions, and the 2017 Laureate Award Ceremony & Watch Party.



It was a thrill to be in the room with so many powerful people who were working together toward a common goal. Listening to Dr. Akinwumi Adesina, this year's laureate, was inspiring and life-changing. On the final morning, Leo participated in a Roundtable Panel where she presented her paper in front of three professors: one from China, one from Liberia, and one from Mississippi. They are experts in the fields of genetic engineering, biotechnology, bioimaging in large animals, and international programs.



I was proud to watch and listen as Leo confidently presented and defended her proposal. Leo's paper was about introducing vaccines to cattle in Ethiopia. Her idea for people in America to donate when visiting the veterinarian toward a vaccination box was well received by the judges. Leo was also able to speak to someone from the USDA about possible internship opportunities.






