1. Being bilingual has positive effects on the brain

Studies show that being bilingual has many cognitive benefits. According to research, speaking a second language can mean that you have a better attention span and can multitask better than monolinguals. This is because being bilingual means you are constantly switching from one language to the other. Numerous other studies suggest that bilingualism can also reduce the risk of having a stroke.

Cognitive benefits effect both bilingual kids and bilingual adults. Children as young as seven months who are exposed to more than one language tend to adjust better to changes in the environment. For older bilinguals, there tends to be less cognitive decline.

2. Bilingualism gives you the educational advantage

Many of the cognitive benefits mentioned above can also mean that bilinguals have an advantage at school or further education. Many studies show that those who speak a second language are more likely to be less distracted and more focused on tasks.

Even bilingual children who are educated in their second language, have actually been seen to outperform monolingual students in their native language.

The recent Millennium Cohort Study found many educational benefits for bilingual children. Their research showed that even though children who are educated in their second language may initially lag behind around three, four and five years old, they soon catch up and outperform their peers by age seven.

3. Languages are highly valued in the workplace

Speaking a second language has numerous employment benefits. Being bilingual means that there are more job opportunities depending on which languages you speak. Communication in the workplace is important, and more companies, especially those with international offices, are considering bilingualism a high priority.

Fast growing fields such as tourism, journalism and translation put great value on bilingual employees. Additional languages on the resume could have your application moved to the top of the pile and give you a better chance at getting the job, even if you aren't as qualified as another monolingual applicant.

Newton-Conover High school and their NJROTC unit is proud to announce that Cadet Caleb Lake won third place overall at the State competition for the Voice of Democracy essay contest. Voice of Democracy is a Veteran of Foreign Wars scholarship program that involves writing and reading an essay on the topic of "Our hope for the future."

After winning the local and district level competition, Caleb and his family attended an all expenses paid awards banquet in Cary, North Carolina with other district winners. It was a pleasant surprize when Caleb was announced to be third in the State. Third place comes with a \$200 cash prize and a \$2000 scholarship which Caleb plans to take full advantage. Caleb's entire NJROTC class was assigned the essay contest as an individual assignment to take advantage opportunity. Caleb's submission was judged "best of class," and submitted to the local VFW Post 1957 for competition.

On January 27th of January Newton Conover NJROTC Academic Team finished third out of twenty- four schools from North Carolina and South Carolina in West Lincoln High School's Academic Brain Brawl. The Brain Brawl is a Naval Science version of "Quiz Bowl" performed in a "Jeopardy style" buzzer format including the Jeopardy music! round. The competition features questions taken from curriculum of all four NJROTC years of study, from Naval Science 1 to Naval Science 4. In December, Newton-Conover NJROTC Air Rifle Team competed in the North Carolina and South Carolina Region 1 Air Rifle Championship.
