Rating makes district one of the highest rated in California

San Jose, Calif., (March 6, 2017) – Standard and Poor's has announced that it has assigned its Triple A rating to the Campbell Union High School District, making it one of the highest rated school districts in California. The rating is rare and difficult to achieve.

In determining the rating, Standard and Poor's took into consideration several factors that allowed for the designation, the factors were:

- Large, diverse and growing local tax base
- Well established and significant depth into "Basic Aid" or community funded status
- Growing District enrollment, which illustrates desirability for access to Campbell high schools
- Large and stable annual General Fund reserves of approximately 20% to expenditures
- Access to local parcel tax revenues, which help augment funding for District operations
- Very low debt burden, specific to Campbell UHSD, when compared to other local school districts
- District Board policy to establish General Fund reserves above State minimum requirement
- Establishment of an irrevocable trust to address OPEB liabilities and scheduled increases to STRS/PERS employer contributions

"As a district, we are extremely fortunate to live in a community that is supportive of our efforts," said Dr. Robert Bravo, Superintendent, Campbell Union High School District. "Their support at the ballot box will allow us the opportunity to continue moving in the direction where all of our students will go to college."
