THE DEMANDS OF DISCIPLESHIP

Today we encounter readings that already have a Lenten feel about them. Nineveh undergoes a forty-day fast, the psalmist reminds us that God alone can show sinners the way, Paul shows us how fleeting the things and events of this world are, and Jesus cries out "Repent!" before he calls his new followers. "Come after me," Jesus says, but if we are to truly live out the commands and demands of our discipleship through baptism, we must first know our need for conversion, our repentance, our need to believe in the gospel fully. Today's Gospel opens with the stark reminder of what befell John the Baptist for completely living out his vocation as the herald of Christ and the gospel: he was arrested, imprisoned, and martyred. Though few of us will experience consequences that extreme, we must all be ready to risk some sort of rejection as, heeding the call of Jesus, we live out the kingdom of God at hand, repent of our sins, and believe in the good news of salvation.



ROMAN (?) CATHOLIC



As we all know, we are members of the Roman Catholic Church, the first of all the Christian religions, a church that has been in existence for 2,000 years. We are definitely Roman Catholics. .

Except for one thing.

There is no Roman Catholic Church.

To understand where that term came from, we have to go back to the earliest days of the Christian religion. The term "Catholic Church" actually goes back to the very beginning of the religion, soon after the Apostles had taken their teachings to many areas in the Roman Empire. Needless to say, there were no set ways of doing things in the earliest days, so each area developed its own rituals and prayers.

However, some people in some areas, began developing their own view of things beyond rituals and prayers. One group said that Jesus was only human, not God. Another group said that Jesus was not human at all, but only a spirit from God. Very quickly, the apostles and their disciples declared these groups wrong and began to clarify the teachings of the church. The result was a group of churches which were different in rituals, but united in belief. As early as the beginning of the second century, St. Ignatius of Antioch called these united churches by the name of Catholic (meaning universal).

In the third century, the Council of Nicea wrote a creed (which we use in our Mass) declaring that we were "one, holy, catholic and apostolic church", basically tying together the various rites that had developed. There were Byzantine, Chaldean, Maronite and a number of others which are still part of the Catholic Church today.

Over the centuries, there has been separation of various parts of the church multiple times. The Coptic church of North Africa was the first major separation in the fifth century, and the Eastern Orthodox church of Greece was a major loss in 1054. Finally, of course, came the Reformation in the 16th century. It was this separation that led to the Catholic Church being referred to as the *Roman Catholic Church*.

For most of the nations of Europe, the Reformation separated the people of each nation into religious camps. Some nations (France, Spain, Portugal, Italy) stayed Catholic, others broke into Protestant sects. England, however, went in a different direction. The entire Catholic Church, bishops, priests and laity, separated from Rome and became a church under the King.

In doing this, they still considered themselves Catholic (and the Catholic Church continued to recognize their priests and bishops as being legitimate for quite a while), but did not want to be associated with Rome and the Pope. They are the ones who started claiming that the Church was split into three parts, The Anglican Catholic, the Orthodox Catholic, and the Roman Catholic churches. From that point on, English speaking people referred to the church under the Pope as the *Roman Catholic Church*.

One final confusion was the fact that Cardinals are referred to as Holy Roman Cardinals. This, however, is not due to the name of the church, but to the fact that to vote for the Pope, a cardinal must be incardinated in the Diocese of Rome. They are, however, Cardinals of the Catholic Church, not the Roman Catholic Church. ~DN

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

One of the most unusual Catholic churches in the world is in Amsterdam: Our Lord in the Attic, or as the locals say, "Ons Lieve Heer op Solder." What looks like a beautiful narrow brick mansion alongside a canal is a clever disguise for a very well-preserved seventeenth-century home and a secret church. During the Reformation, the Netherlands was divided into Protestant Holland and the Spanish Netherlands, now known as Belgium, a Catholic stronghold. Protestant reformers seized all the Catholic parishes in Holland and "de-Catholicized" them. New laws forbade the celebration of the Mass in public. St. Nicholas Church was renamed "Old Church" by the new owners, and the dispossessed Catholics got to work "hiding" St. Nicholas Parish in the upper floors of this mansion. Other Catholics did the same thing, but this is the only hidden church that survives today. Sunday Mass is still celebrated here.

It's a beautiful hideaway, with nothing spared in regard to marble, gilding, a pipe organ, and classic Dutch painting. A few steps away, the Old Church, begun in 1250, stands emptied of the statues and carvings of its Catholic days, its windows replaced by plain glass. The new tenants gave up when it came to the ceiling, which is still painted with saints, biblical scenes, and merchant ships. The Dutch reformers were tolerant sorts, and as long as the Catholics kept out of sight, they were out of mind. Catholicism was at last tolerated in Holland after 1853, but in 1924 when the International Eucharistic Congress was held in Amsterdam, processions of Catholics were still forbidden in the streets. Today, Roman Catholics are about 19 percent of the population, and there's no need for any of them to hide in the attic.


