ANNUAL REPORT 2007-08

The mission of Reed City Area Public Schools is to provide high quality educational opportunities that encourage all to reach their highest potential and nurture talents in an environment that connects students, school and community.

Since the first doors to public education were opened in Reed City in 1872, Reed City Area Public Schools has enjoyed a rich history of academic, athletic and extra-curricular excellence. The standards established by the Board of Education, administrators, teachers, support staff and the public challenge the district's students to be the very best they can be.

For the 2007-08 school year, the district consisted of G. T. Norman Elementary School (grades K-5), Reed City Middle School (grades 6-8), Reed City High School (grades 9-12), Reed City Community High School (alternative education) and Reed City Adult Education. All K-12 schools are accredited institutions. Grades 9-12 are accredited through the North Central Association accreditation process and grades K-6 are accredited through the state of Michigan's Education YES!

Twenty-two school buses and vans transport an average of 930 students approximately 1,700 miles every school day, with over 67% of the students in the district eligible to ride the bus to school.

Reed City Area Public Schools has established a philosophy of "Children First!," which is the prime basis for making all decisions.

North Central Association accreditation requires all teachers to have qualifications and skills to teach in their subject areas and school buildings to meet all policies and standards for quality programming. 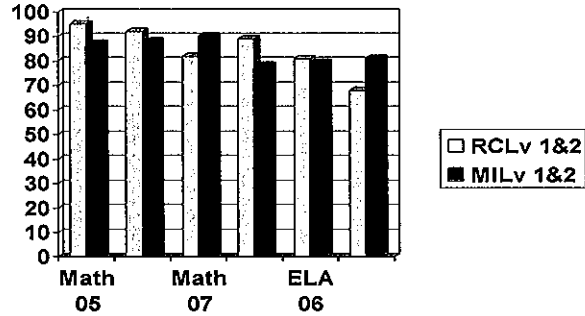

All school buildings in the Reed City Area Public Schools district have individual mission statements and philosophies that connect closely between buildings and in conjunction with school improvement plans and accreditation.

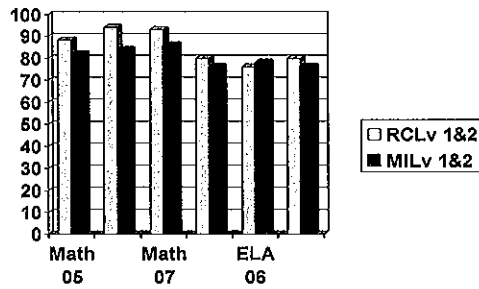

in percentages

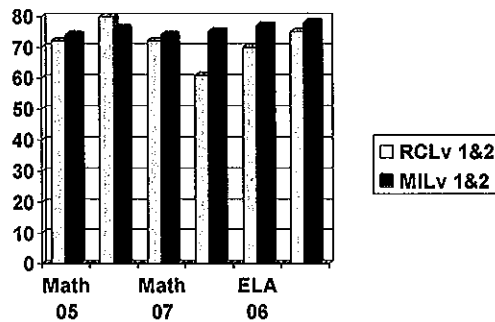

Disaggregation by Subgroup

As we analyze our MEAP data by subgroup, we have come to these conclusions:

Racial Minorities so thinly populate our student body, we have chosen not to report data disaggregated by race for fear that we would be violating students' rights to privacy.

Gender differences in performance suggest the possibility of a trend that we need to monitor. Over several years, it appears that our girls outperform our boys in many core areas. We need to address this problem in a manner that will assure that gender bias is not built into any of our programming.

Special Education and **Low Income** students perform at state AYP standards but lower than our regular education and non-low income students. We have multiple interventions at every level to address this problem, including: All Day/Every Day Kindergarten, LIFT mentoring, Title I support, Immediate Help/Tutorial program and remedial classes.

Limited Proficiency students are nonexistent in our district.

In addition to MEAP testing, Reed City High School provides Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery Testing, Preliminary PSAT/NMSQT testing, the PLAN test and the ACT test.

ADEQUATE YEARLY PROGRESS

For 2007-08, it has been reported that G. T. Norman Elementary School and Reed City Middle School of Reed City Area Public Schools have met the requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act for Adequate Yearly Progress.

TEACHER QUALIFICATION

All K-12 teachers in Reed City Area Public Schools are highly qualified as defined by the No Child Left Behind Act.

FEDERAL FUNDING

Reed City Area Public Schools receives federal funds to help reduce class and group sizes. Higher scores on the MEAP, along with a drop in discipline referrals, can be attributed in part to the smaller class sizes.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT AND DUAL ENROLLMENT

Reed City High School offers students Advanced Placement courses in AP English (British Literature), AP English (World Literature), AP Psychology and Michigan Virtual University courses. Dual enrollment opportunities are available through Baker College and Ferris State University.

STUDENT RECORDS REGULATED BY LAW

Federal and State laws provide parents, guardians and students over the age of 18 with certain rights regarding the confidentiality of school records. Parents of a student or an eligible student have the right to:

- Inspect and review the educational records of the student.
- Request information contained in such records be amended if inaccurate, misleading or violates the privacy or other rights of the student.
- Request a hearing to challenge the content of the student's records.

Student records consist of personal and family data, health and immunization records, test data (aptitude, interest, intelligence and achievement tests), achievement and attendance records, anecdotal records, records of conferences, copies of pertinent correspondence, records from other districts and individualized educational plans for special needs students.

Parents, guardians or eligible students may request a review of records if desired at the appropriate building, and a review will be scheduled within thirty days.

Student academic and attendance records are retained for 99 years, unless transferred to another district. Personally identifiable information from the record of students will not be released without the prior written consent of the parent, guardian or eligible student. Information may be released to certain individuals or agencies as permitted by law.

FREE AND REDUCED LUNCH PROGRAM

Free and reduced price meals for children unable to pay the full price are served under the National School Lunch and Breakfast Program. Reed City joins all other schools in the Mecosta-Osceola Intermediate School District in participating in the cost-savings program. A letter explaining the program guidelines and application forms is sent home with all students during the first week of school. Households are encouraged to complete an application form for each student and return it to the school where the student attends. Eligibility for the free and reduced price meals is automatic if food stamps or FIP Benefits are received for a child. Information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility and verifying data. Applications may be verified at any time during the year, and changes in household income must be reported to the district. Free and reduced price meal benefits may be applied for any time during the school year.

SPECIALIZED EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

Many specialized educational opportunities are available to students in the Reed City Area Public Schools district. Some of them include Reed City Community High School (alternative education), adult education and GED programs, the Mecosta-Osceola Career Center (vocational/technical education), the Mecosta-Osceola Math/Science Center (accelerated math/science education), and the Mecosta-Osceola Educational Center (special education and handicapped services). Classroom programs are offered for students in development of cognitive, affective and psychomotor areas through the Mecosta-Osceola Intermediate School District utilizing the Individualized Educational Planning Committee (IEPC) process.

AMERICAN DISABILITIES ACT

Reed City Area Public Schools does not discriminate on the basis of disability, sex, age or race with regard to admission, access to services, treatment or employment in programs and activities as explained in Section 504 of the American Disabilities Act. No person because of race, color, national origin, gender, age or disability shall be excluded from participation in, be denied

benefits or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the district's United States Department of Agriculture donated food and child nutrition programs.

HANDICAP SERVICES

Reed City Area Public Schools provides services for handicapped students by providing appropriate identification, evaluations and services to all eligible students under Section 504 of the Vocational Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and current special education laws. PARENT PARTICIPATION

Reed City Area Public Schools is committed to involving parents in the education of their children and the entire school process. Teachers and administrators recognize the importance of parent involvement in the success of students. Parent-teacher conference participation in the fall and spring is very good, and parents are encouraged to attend open houses, participate in support/booster organizations and volunteer in the classrooms for projects, field trips, etc. Parent-Teacher Conference participation follows:

RETENTION REPORT

The retention rate represents the percentage of ninth grade students who graduate from high school within four years, adjusted for students who move in and out of the district and to alternative education programs. DISTRICT LEADERSHIP TEAM

The District Leadership Team was created several years ago to review the direction of the district in many areas but particularly in reference to North Central Accreditation. Membership of this team consists of building NCA chairs, building administrators, three parent representatives from each building, teaching and support staff association presidents, the superintendent and Board of Education members

CURRICULUM

The District Curriculum Coordinator and building administrators supervise K-12 curriculum in the district, with curriculum review and revision on a rotating cycle. Department heads review the grade level content expectations (GLCEs) and align the curriculum to state standards, which is taken to building administrators and superintendent, reviewed by the Board of Education Curriculum Committee, and then recommended to the full Board of Education for adoption. The process is designed to align K-12 curriculum with the State Core Curriculum and Assessment Frameworks, and to promote continuity between grade levels.

SCHOOL CLOSING/DELAY INFORMATION

Student safety is our first priority, so severe weather and resulting dangerous road conditions are carefully monitored. A computerized weather satellite system provides up-to-date information regarding changing conditions. Wind chill factor temperatures are also provided by this system, which are used in making decisions regarding outside recess in very cold weather.
