Students have the opportunity to take Advanced Placement® course work and exams. The AP® participation rate at Kalani High School is 57 percent. The student body makeup is 52 percent male and 48 percent female, and the total minority enrollment is 92 percent. Kalani High School is 1 of 55 high schools in the Hawaii Department Of Education. Schools are ranked based on their performance on state-required tests and how well they prepare students for college.

Honorable Mention. Shrine of Paradise. Photographer: Joshua Ishimaru. 2018 we celebrate the 150 years of Japanese in Hawaii since the “first year men” arrival in 1868. The “first year men” or the Gannenmono were the first Japanese immigrants that came to Hawaii. Many of these Japanese citizens were attracted to the \$4-a-month wage as well as the free travel to a “tropical island”. However, it was a little different than what they expected it to be. Though the islands were very indeed tropical the plantation conditions were rough with long workdays, hard labor, and lives were very strict. Although with this said together the Japanese immigrants tried to make everything like how it was back home by continuing their culture and legacy down the line of generations to come. Being Japanese myself I think I can relate to the term “Okage Sama De” which translates to I am what I am because of you. If it weren’t for these early men and women I don’t know if my family would have immigrated to the US. With this said the image I decided to capture to reflect upon the 150 year history of Japanese in Hawaii was a picture of the Izumo Taishakyo. For my photo theme I decided to go with a film look for I wanted to give a retro-ish feel to this image making it seem like I was taken in the past. Hawaii Izumo Taisha was founded in 1906 , in 1907 a temporary shrine was built, and in 1922 the permanent shrine building Izumo Taishakyo that we know today was completed. Every new year, my family and I gather together at this shrine to pray for our well being and safety for the rest of the year. OIA FOOTBALL PARENT PASSES NO LONGER AVAILABLE

As a result of the realigned football schedule (that includes interleague games between the OIA and ILH), each league has agreed that their respective parent passes will not be accepted at interleague games.

To eliminate confusion at the gate, the OIA has eliminated the Football Parent Passes but will still offer parent passes for other sports.

STUDENT ACTIVITY CARD

As a result of the realigned football schedule that includes interleague games between the OIA and ILH each league has agreed that their respective Student Activity Card will not be accepted at interleague games. The Student Activity Card will still be honored for all OIA regular season games. The cost for the Student Activity Card is \$25.00 and is good for admission to all Kalani regular season games both home and away for football, volleyball and basketball. The student must show their Student Activity Card to receive the student admission price for interleague games. Without the card students will pay the \$7.00 general admission rate for each game.

ASET FEE

The Athletic Supply Equipment and Transportation Fee (ASET) is a one-time per school year fee assessed to student-athletes once they have been selected to the team. The fee is good for as many sports as your child is selected for within the school year. The fee is used to cover transportation costs for all sports (the amount allocated to schools by the state is not nearly enough to cover the annual transportation costs). With these funds, Kalani will provide transportation to and from all regular season and post season games. The fee will also cover airfare and ground transportation expenses if post season play is on the Neighbor Island.

The Student Activity Card will no longer be provided upon payment of the ASET Fee and must be purchased separately. The ASET Fee will be \$60.00 for the 2018 – 2019 School Year.

All student fees – grade level and athletic fees are approved annually by the School Community Council
